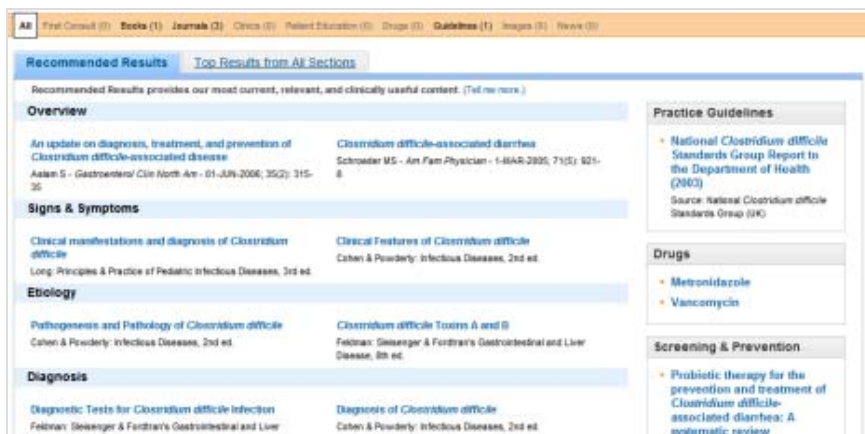

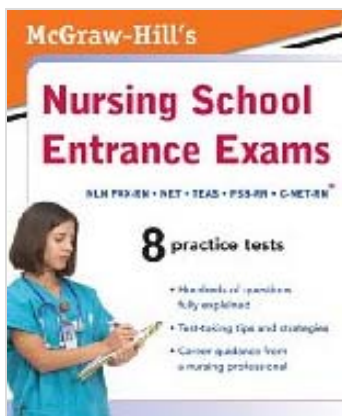

You can combine concepts with AND, OR, and NOT or search for exact phrases by enclosing your term in quotation marks. MDConsult will display your results in an organized manner for easy scanning and retrieval.

- *The Harriet Lane Handbook*, 18th edition

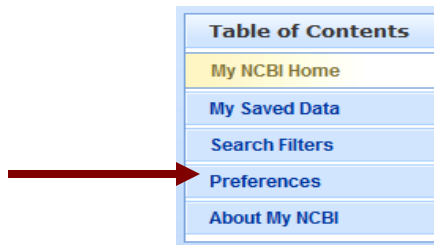

Search Tips & Tricks: PubMed My NCBI – Part 2

In the previous issue we reviewed setting up a PubMed *My NCBI* account to save searches and set up automatic alerts; in this issue we'll review applying user **Preferences** to highlight your search terms in your results lists. Highlighting can make it easier to scan your results and select the most relevant articles.

To turn on highlighting:

1. Go to PubMed and sign into your My NCBI account by clicking on the **Sign In** link in the upper right corner of the screen
2. Once you've logged in, click on the **My NCBI** link in the upper right corner
3. Click on the **Preferences** link in the Table of Contents on the left side of the screen



4. Under "Common Preferences," click on the **Highlighting** link



5. Select a color and click the **Save** button

Your search terms will now be highlighted in your results display.

Access to Continuing Education Resources

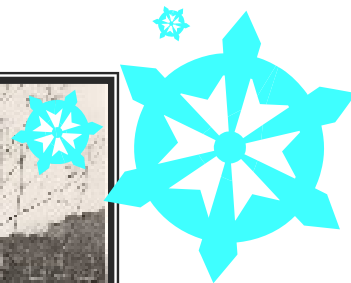
We have created a new web page that brings together resources associated with continuing education. A link to this page can be found on the left hand side of the Sladen Library main page under the heading "Specialty Pages." Here, we have pulled together CE resources that are relevant for physicians, nurses, pharmacists and allied health personnel. There are two resources we would like to highlight this month. They are NCME TV (Network for Continuing Medical Education) and Natural Medicines. Both of these resources offer programs that qualify for free continuing education credits.

You can register for NCME utilizing the hospital ID found on this page: <http://marcopolo.hfhs.org:8080/sliden/NCME-TV.htm>. Registrants will have access to a variety of online programs and will receive email notifications for new programs as they become available.

Natural Medicines provides educational courses on natural medicine topics that focus on various diseases. These can be found in their *Clinical Management* series. Each course reviews the traditional drug therapy for a condition and how natural medicines work similarly or differently than the traditional therapies. Registration does not require a specific ID.

The Clinic Building was designed and constructed by the architectural firm, Voorhees, Walker, Foley and Smith between 1951-1955. Under the leadership of Drs. Frank J. Sladen and Roy McClure, the Ford Foundation funded the project with 23 million dollars to continue the hospital mission in the City of Detroit. The project added 131,000 square feet of space for 14 specialty outpatient clinics, 16 new operating rooms, diagnostic and radiology facilities and a new medical library to support the medical programs. The photograph above was taken December 15, 1951 during the construction of the Clinic Building.

New Year Brings New Changes to the Electronic Journal Collection

The new year has brought some changes to the library's electronic and print journal collection. Based on the flexibility and popularity of electronic journals, we made a conscious decision to cancel the paper versions of journals and subscribe to the online-only versions whenever feasible. As a result, we moved 71 journals to online-only subscriptions for 2009.

However, online journal access sometimes comes at a high cost, and for two popular journals it was not reasonable to pay the subscription price the publisher required. A 1-year online access subscription for the journal *Drugs* was quoted at \$15,947, and the journal *Science* was quoted at \$22,990. While these are highly used titles, it was not within the library's budget to continue online subscriptions, so we chose to subscribe to their paper versions at a much lower rate. On the brighter side, adding MDConsult to our collection of databases has given us access to 51 e-journals through the MDConsult interface. This includes access to 36 of the popular *Clinics* titles including *Critical Care Clinics* and *Gastroenterology Clinics of North America*.

The beginning of the year is always an active time for journal changes as subscription and publisher shifts go into effect. If you run into any problems accessing online journals, please let us know. As always, we hope you find the 2009 journal collection useful!

Changes to Searching the CINAHL Database

On January 1, 2009, the CINAHL database was removed from Ovid and made available exclusively on the EBSCOhost interface. Ebsco, who owns the rights to CINAHL, decided they no longer wanted to license the data to other companies. While the CINAHL data remains the same in EBSCOhost, the method of searching the new database is very different from Ovid.

This is a big change, even for the librarians! We are currently working on new training materials to help make this transition easier for our CINAHL users. Coming Soon...

We are almost ready to start testing ILLiad, our new document and interlibrary loan management system. Users will be able to create their own accounts using their library IDs and passwords. Some advantages of using the new system are:

- The ability to initiate and track your requests
- The ability to maintain a history of your requests
- The system automatically emails you when a document has arrived
- Books can be renewed online
